Uniform Introduction

“Uniforms show that you are part of an organisation. Wearing it says we’re all in this together,” Jason Wing, head teacher at the Neale-Wade academy in Cambridgeshire.

‘...where a majority of schools do not have a uniform, roughly 160,000 children miss school every day due to fear of attack or intimidation by other students. This might not be directly linked to what they’re wearing, but having a uniform can be a safety net for many students who might otherwise suffer from bullying. Uniform Outline

For male students: they are expected to wear a white thobe with a white hat

For female students: they are expected to wear a black burqa with a white scarf

Incorrect Uniform
